A SHORT REFLECTION ON THE SECRED PASCHAL TRIDUUM

PART ONE: HOLY THURSDAY OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

The Sacred Paschal Triduum refers to the three holiest days of the year. The three days are the Holy Thursday of the Lord's Supper, the Good Friday of the Lord's Passion and the Holy Saturday of the Easter Vigil. All the ceremonies on these three days are only one single but continuous celebration.

On Holy Thursday morning the Bishop and his Priests celebrate the Chrism Mass during which priests renew their promises before their bishop. It is a special day for the entire priests throughout the world. It is our general anniversary. At the same ceremony the three different oils used by the church namely; Oil of Chrism, Oil of Catechumen and Oil of the Sick are blessed. In the evening of the same day the Holy Mass of the Lord's Supper is celebrated. Consequently, three events are involved on Holy Thursday: the Institution of the

Holy Eucharist, the Institution of the Holy Orders and the Call for Fraternal Charity and Service.

On the night of the Passover meal, Christ instituted the Eucharist and called on his disciples (his Priests) and all of us to continue to celebrate this great mystery in his memory. Through the ministry of the priesthood, Christ is made present to his people. This fulfills his promise to be with us always till the end of time.

In the Holy Orders the Priest performs a three-fold role as Priest that sanctifies his people through Prayers and the Sacraments, as Prophet that teaches and admonish his people, and as King who leads his people just like a shepherd leads and guides his flock.

Finally, the last event is that of the Washing of Feet which expresses Fraternal Charity and Service. As Jesus said: "Just as the Son of Man did not come to be served."

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but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many"; (Matthew 20:28). By virtue of our baptism, we all are called to this fraternal charity and humble service to one another, both in good and in bad times. We need to exercise this function more at this time of COVID-19 pandemic, though with extreme precaution.

As I celebrate the Holy Thursday event with our deacon, I assure you of my prayers and God's blessings and protection. Remember that Confession is by appointment. You may call the office. Be safe and remain blessed.

PART TWO: GOOD FRIDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD

On this day, being *Good Friday*, the universal Church celebrates the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus, the *suffering Messiah* carried his Cross to Golgotha in order to pay his price for our salvation. "He was pierced through for faults, crushed for our sins. On him lies a punishment that brings us healed" (Is. 53:5). His wounds and bruises paid the price of our transgressions. His suffering and death are great price for the whole humanity.

To be a true follower of Christ, we must be ready to take up our Cross and follow Him. Jesus says to his disciples in Matthew 16:24: "If anyone wants to follow me, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me." Anyone who finds it difficult to do this will never be a true follower of Christ. As we commemorate the death of Christ, and as we face the challenges and hardship posed by COVID-19 pandemic, may we all learn to die to sin so that we can rise with Christ to new life. May we also share in His suffering today through prayers, fasting and sacrifices that we will surely share in His glory in few days to come!

Furthermore, on the Good Friday of the Lord's Passion we celebrate the utmost expression of God's love for us. Here Jesus willingly suffered and died for us. In the Passion narrative, we may

discover the **three** kinds of suffering Jesus encountered.

- Mental Suffering Jesus endured the pain of betrayal, hatred and desertion by his loved ones.
- 2. **Physical Suffering** He endured the pain of torture. Jesus was brutally beaten, crowned with thorns and nailed to the Cross.
- Spiritual Suffering He endured the pain of abandonment. Jesus hung helplessly on the Cross, hence he cried out: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matt. 27: 46).

Brothers and sisters, whenever we find ourselves suffering in one of these ways, especially in the present situation of COVID-19 coronavirus pandemic, we should turn to Jesus in prayer for he suffered before us. He knows how we feel in such a situation, and he will not fail to strengthen us.

At times one may ask, why should God allow this or that suffering to befall him? What crime has he committed that he should face such trials? Whenever we have such thoughts in mind let us remember that Jesus was innocent. Though he was innocent he accepted to die a shameful death on the cross. Why?

The suffering and death of Jesus speak to us in **three** ways.

First, it is a **Sign of LOVE**. Jesus says: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13).

Second, it is an **Invitation to LOVE**. He says: "This is my commandment: love one another as I love you" (John 15: 12).

Finally, it is a Revelation about LOVE. He summoned the crowd with his disciples and said to them, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me" (Mark 8: 34).

My beloved parishioners let us bear witness to this message of Jesus, by words and deeds. Let us testify to God's love for us which is made manifest

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in the suffering and death of our Lord, Jesus Christ. The Cross of Jesus is not a sign of defeat or weakness but rather a sign of victory over sin and death. Let us hand over to God all we are and all we have. *God is good! All the time!*

PART THREE:

PART THREE: HOLY SATURDAY OF EASTER VIGIL

In the morning of today which is Holy Saturday, the third day of the Paschal Triduum, the entire Holy Church is silent and waits in prayer for the resurrection of the Savior which we shall celebrate this evening during the Paschal Vigil. That is why this morning there are no liturgical celebration as such, no masses. Only private prayers in silence waiting for the great dawn of celebration we are going to have in the evening of today.

In the evening of today in which we are going to celebrate the Paschal Mystery, four major items are to be celebrated. They are the Liturgy of the Light, the Liturgy of the Word, the Liturgy of the Baptism and the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

In the **Liturgy of the Light,** we are going to celebrate Christ as the Light of the world. The celebration begins outside the church in which the priest and the congregation find themselves in total darkness. All light is turned out. The fire is blessed and from the holy fire the **Paschal Candle** is lighted and the red hot charcoal from the blessed fire is put in the thurible for the incense. The deacon carrying the Paschal Candle leads the procession to the church. The liturgy of the Light ends with the Easter proclamation called the *Exsultet,* which is a song of joy announcing the Light of Christ. It summons all creation to celebrate Christ as the Light of the world.

In the **Liturgy of the Word** we have seven readings from the Old Testament and two readings from the New Testament. The entire readings remind us of our journey with God from creation to our redemption. It is all about Creation, fall of mankind, God's Covenant with his people, the testimonies of the Prophets concerning the expected Messiah, the fulfillment of the prophecies with the coming of Christ and then our Redemption through Christ's Passion, Death and Resurrection.

In the **Liturgy of Baptism**, the aspirants to the Christian faith which is called the Catechumen are baptized and initiated into the Mystical Body of Christ – the Church. The Sacrament of Confirmation can equally be administered at this point. All those already baptized will also renew their baptismal vows and become regenerated in Christ.

In the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the newly baptized and all communicants share in the family love feast with Christ as our head. Here we receive his Precious Body and Blood as a family. The Eucharist is true food and drink but at the same time, it is very different from every other food and drink. We transform ordinary food into our own bodies but the Eucharist transforms us into the Body of Christ. As Ludwig rightly pointed out, we become what we eat.

Finally, the ceremonies of the Holy Saturday are all about waiting and watching in hope of the victory of life over death, of truth over falsity, of light over darkness, and of justice over injustice. This is the good news we all await, the good news that ends with a joyful song: "Alleluia!" To God be the glory.

Brothers and sisters, with the frustrations and challenges posed by the *COVID-19* pandemic, let us look to our loving God for an end to it. Christ our victor over death will see us through these hard times. Do not ever give up. God is still in control. He is good! All the time! Be safe and remain blessed.

PART FOUR: EASTER SUNDAY

(Acts 10:34, 38-42; Colossians 3:1-4; John 20:1-9)

"This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad" (Psalm 118:24). This is our Responsorial Psalm for Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord. Why do we rejoice today? We rejoice because our faith in Christ has been vindicated, truth has triumphed over falsity, justice over injustice and tragedy has turned into comedy.

On **Good Friday** we heard of the story of how Jesus was falsely charged of crimes he did not commit, and unjustly sentenced to a death he did not deserve. His good friend betrayed him, his trusted

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companions deserted him and his number one man denied him. The people he loved demanded his crucifixion and chose to have the bandit Barabbas released in his place.

It is a story of betrayal and lies, dishonesty and meanness, unfaithfulness and wicked violence directed against an innocent and apparently helpless victim. Jesus was scourged, mocked, led on the death march, nailed to the cross where he dies after a few hours and hastily buried in a tomb. It would have been a bad story - a tragedy, if that were the end of the story. But glory be to God it is not.

Death is not the end of the story. There is one more final chapter, a chapter of the story of Jesus rising from the dead in all glory and majesty. He is vindicated. His enemies are shamed and confused. Jesus regains his eternal glory with the Father. He is the Lord, who will prevail over all humankind, his enemies included. For us his embattled followers this is good news.

It is good news to know that truth is immortal. We

can suppress Truth, accuse it of being a lie, condemn it, torture it, kill it, and bury it in the grave but on the third day Truth will rise again. Remember this and do not give up on Truth even when everybody seems to give up on it. Do not give up on Truth; do not give up on Justice. Do not give up on doing what is right. True will always be true. We must learn to believe in the sun even when it is not shining; knowing that by and by it will shine again.

My dear people of God, it is the end of the story that counts. That is why the church asks us today to rejoice and be glad. This period in our life, we are facing enormous difficulties as a result of **COVID-19** coronavirus pandemic. We have heard many confusing and conflicting views on the issue. God is not asleep. He is fully aware of all these trials. Yes, we are going through very difficult times: through betrayal, unjust discrimination, lies, and misrepresentations. At times the enemy seems to be winning the battle in our lives. Today Christ has won. And we know that in Christ we shall overcome.
