EASTER SUNDAY REFLECTION FROM REV. FR. HERBERT ENE

(Acts 10: 34, 38-42; Colossians 3:1-4; John 20: 1-9)

"This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad" (Psalm 118:24).

This is our **Responsorial Psalm** for Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord. Why do we rejoice today? We rejoice because our faith in Christ has been vindicated, truth has triumphed over falsity, justice over injustice and tragedy has turned into comedy.

On **Good Friday** we heard of the story of how Jesus was falsely charged of crimes he did not commit, and unjustly sentenced to a death he did not deserve. His good friend betrayed him, his trusted companions deserted him and his number one man denied him. The people he loved demanded his crucifixion and chose to have the bandit Barabbas released in his place.

It was a story of betrayal and lies, dishonesty and meanness, unfaithfulness and wicked violence directed against and innocent and apparently helpless victim. Jesus was scourged, mocked, led on the death march, nailed to the Cross where he dies after a few hours an hastily buried in a tomb. It would have been a bad story—a tragedy, if that were the end of the story. But glory be to God it is not.

Death is not the end of the story. There is one more final chapter, a chapter of the story of **Jesus rising from the dead in all glory and majesty.** He is vindicated. His enemies are shamed and confused. Jesus regains his eternal glory with the Father. He is the Lord, who will prevail over all humankind, his enemies included. For us his embattled followers this is good news. **Praise God! Alleluia!**

It is good news to know that **truth is immortal.** We can suppress Truth, accuse it of being a lie, condemn it, torture it, kill it, and bury it in the grave; All in pursuit of our life's ambitions, but on the third day **Truth will rise again.** Remember this and do not give up on Truth even when everybody seems to give up on it. Do not give up on Truth; do not give up on Justice. Do not give up on doing what is right. True will always be true. We must learn to believe in the sun even when it is not shining; knowing that by and by it will shine again.

Brothers and sisters, it is the end of the story that counts. That is why the

This period in our life, we are facing enormous difficulties as a result of **COVID-19** pandemic. We are facing both health, political, and economic crisis. We have heard many confusing and conflicting views on the **COVID-19 and its vaccines**. At this point in time, we are struggling with the dark side of our human nature. It is a struggle between light and darkness, between good and evil, between life and death. At such a moment, we need to remind ourselves that God is not asleep. He is fully aware of these trials.

Although the darkness and death often appear to be stronger than the light and life, they have not yet triumphed. Jesus has proved them wrong by his resurrection from the dead. This victory is what we celebrate today. The words of the Easter Vigil liturgy express their victorious reign of Christ in a special way: **"The power of this holy [Easter] night," it proclaims, "dispels all evil, washes guilt away, restores lost innocence, brings mourners joy. It casts our hatred, brings us peace, and humbles earthly pride."**

Our celebration of Easter reminds us that **the darkness of evil and hatred will never have the last say.** Yes, we may be going through very difficult times: through betrayal, unjust discrimination, lies, and misrepresentations. At times the enemy seems to be winning the battle in our lives. Today Christ has won, both in us and in our world. And we know that in Christ we shall overcome.

The Risen Lord himself, represented our beautiful Easter Candle burning in our midst, is asking us to leave behind the works of darkness, to renounce and reject anything and everything in our lives which is dark, sinister and evil. And as persons connected to Jesus by baptism, we need to **'walk always as children of the light'**, following in his footsteps. We should reject darkness, evil and sin in every shape and form, and then promise to follow Jesus Christ from now on, in a life of light, goodness and love, a life shaped by his own powerful example, a life supported and guided by the Holy Spirit, whom he first gave us at baptism. parishioners—individuals and groups, who through their tremendous sacrifices of time, talent and treasure, made this day possible. Many of you worked behind the curtain to see that our two churches (St. Mary Camden and Holy Family Huntingdon) remain clean, safe and beautiful. Permit me not to mention names of groups or individuals, for God who sees in secret knows you and will bless you abundantly. I am proud of you. I wish you all a happy Easter. Remain ever blessed.
